Relative pronouns begin a phrase that describes a noun in more detail or defines it. These phrases are called relative clauses or adjective clauses. Defining clauses don't use commas because they are essential to the sentence, while relative clauses that describe a noun are not essential. WHO  
starts a clause defining a noun.
